Globalization, immigration, transformation

Leicester industrialised, traded with the world, attracted waves of immigrants from rural areas and from countries near and far, and was transformed from a small market town to a large multicultural city. It forms an appropriate backdrop to the overall theme of the conference.



eicester is a vibrant, modern city. Founded in Roman times (and with the remains of its Roman baths still evident in the city centre), Leicester was an important medieval market town and became, in the modern period, a thriving industrial centre specializing in textile production.

What makes Leicester the ideal location for a conference focusing on "globalization, immigration and transformation" is its ethnic mix.

In the mid to late twentieth century the city welcomed refugees from the conflicts in Europe, and then, during the post-war period, large scale immigration from Ireland, South Asia, Uganda, Kenya, and the Caribbean. Leicester is now the most ethnically diverse city in the United Kingdom.

Getting here

Leicester is easily accessible by road (the M1 motorway passes close by) and rail (frequent services to and from London and the north). The nearest airport is Nottingham East Midlands (16 miles), with Birmingham (35 miles), Manchester (69 miles) and London Heathrow (85 miles). There are direct rail links to Stansted, Luton and Gatwick airports.



The weather in Leicester in January is chilly, but not excessively so, with an average high of 7 degrees Celsius (45 degrees F) and low of 1 degree C (34 degrees F), with an average of 4.3 cm rain (1.7 inches) during the month. January days can be brilliantly sunny and cold, or dull, gloomy and mild, and sometimes both in the same day.




